NUI Post-Doctoral Fellowship in the Humanities 2018

1. What is the NUI Post-Doctoral Fellowship in the Humanities?

The NUI Post-Doctoral Fellowship in the Humanities is intended to encourage and support a doctoral graduate of proven academic excellence to advance their scholarly research. It is expected that the research undertaken during the Fellowship will result in a substantial contribution to knowledge, worthy of publication, and contribute to the learning culture in the constituent institutions.

2. How many Post-Doctoral Fellowships in the Humanities will be offered in 2018?

In 2018, one NUI Post-Doctoral Fellowship in the Humanities is offered to NUI graduates in all branches of the Humanities. The value of the Fellowship will be $\in 80,000$ ($\in 40,000$ a year for two years).

3. If successful, where will I be based for the Post-Doctoral Fellowship in the Humanities?

The successful candidate may elect to take up the Fellowship in any of the constituent universities or recognised colleges of NUI, subject to the concurrence of the NUI Senate and the institution concerned.

4. Can I be based in an institution in Ireland that is not part of NUI for the Post-Doctoral Fellowship?

No. The Fellowship is intended to encourage and support a post-doctoral fellow to advance their scholarly research in a constituent university or a recognised college of NUI. You can find a list of NUI institutions at: http://www.nui.ie/elections/docs/institutions.pdf

5. If successful, when will I begin the Post-Doctoral Fellowship in the Humanities?

A start date is usually decided by mutual agreement between the successful candidate, the NUI Registrar and the relevant Head of School in the institution where the candidate will be based.

6. Who can apply for this Scholarship?

- **6.1** Candidates must be graduates of doctoral status (awarded no earlier than 1 January 2013), holding any degree of NUI, whose doctorates are in any area of the Humanities.
- **6.2** Full-time and permanent members of staff of the NUI constituent universities, other NUI member institutions, or other higher education institutions are not eligible to apply for this Fellowship.

7. How do I know if I am a graduate of NUI?

You are an NUI graduate and eligible to apply if you completed a bachelors, masters or doctoral degree in one of the following:

- **7.1** NUI constituent university, i.e. UCD, UCC, NUI Galway or Maynooth University.
- 7.2 NUI recognised college, i.e. RCSI (from 1977) and Uversity (from 2013).
- **7.3** Other NUI member institutions, i.e. NCAD (from 1996), St. Angela's College, Sligo (from 1978), Institute of Public Administration (from 2001).

8. My viva is due to take place after the closing date. Am I eligible to apply?

The closing date for the Post-Doctoral Fellowship in the Humanities competition is **20 April 2018**. Applications will be accepted from candidates who will successfully complete their viva examination by **31 May 2018** and can provide evidence (i.e. academic transcript or letter from Head of School) confirming that they have been formally recommended for a doctoral degree by the university in question no later than **30 June 2018**.

9. Section 5.1 of the Regulations lists seven points to be included in the Research Proposal. Do I need to include these seven points in my Research Proposal in the order they are listed in the Regulations?

No. While these seven points should be included in your Research Proposal, the layout of your Research Proposal is your decision.

10. Will a shortlisting process be applied?

Yes, a shortlisting process will apply. The eligible applications are subject to independent review by two subject specialists. The results of this process help determine the shortlist of candidates for interview.

11. When do the interviews take place?

The interviews are held in the NUI offices in Merrion Square, Dublin 2 and are expected to take place in July 2018.

12. When are the results of the Post-Doctoral Fellowship competition made available?

All candidates are contacted by email following the conclusion of the independent assessment of the applications. At this point, candidates will be informed if they have been invited for interview.

13. Do you provide feedback on applications?

Yes. Feedback on the assessment process and the comments of the subject specialists can be made available on request.

14. Will NUI contact me formally regarding the outcome of my application in the Post-Doctoral Fellowship competition?

Yes, all candidates are regularly updated regarding the status of their application throughout the assessment process and will be contacted formally regarding the overall outcome of their application when the competition is concluded.
